This will provide students with a better idea of the different identities throughout Europe, the similarities and differences between them and how they all come together under the EU umbrella.</p> <p>There is much to be discovered and understood about Europe as each country has its own traditions, food, clothes, holidays. There will be a chapter dedicated to some fun facts such as different World Heritage sites fun and unique celebrations, the flora and fauna, and how these come into play with Europe’s imports and exports.</p>

Methodologies:

The PDF will also contain a list of resources for each topic so that they can do more research should they find it necessary. The educators are advised to read the PDF before presenting the accompanying presentation.</p> <p>2. PowerPoint presentation</p> <p>The second part of this module will consist of a PowerPoint presentation that will be developed to be presented directly towards the children. This presentation will describe all the concepts mentioned above on a basic to intermediate level, with the appropriate language for children 10-14 so that they can get a good grasp and be able to apply them in the appropriate context. The contents will be a mix of text and graph as to maintain an engaging aspect and similarly to the PDF will also include resources where they can get more information if they are interested in understanding certain concepts on a deeper level.</p> <p>3. Online Board Game</p> <p>The last part of this module will be an online board game developed to be played for 1-4 individuals. This game will draw inspiration from other board games such as Trivia Pursuit and Monopoly which have proven to be both educative and engaging for the target audience. The board game will focus on different categories of European life such as art, culture, science, sports, and general knowledge as to provide a well-rounded variety of topics. This will ensure that it can be attractive to all the different interests the target group will have. Through this board game educators and children will be able to test the knowledge gained through the 3 modules and also learn some new fun facts.</p>
